1. INTRODUCTION

This report has been prepared in accordance with the agreed terms and conditions of the Memorandum of Understanding on the Municipal Recycling Scheme and represents the culmination of a very significant body of work by MWAC both in the application of scheme criteria and in the processing of the applications received.

The Memorandum of Understanding on the Municipal Recycling Scheme lists a range of specific activities that are to be undertaken in administering the scheme. They are:

- I. design and maintain the application forms and processes and the attendant database structure required to report on the scheme;
- II. distribute to all eligible organisations before the end of each return period a copy of the Municipal Recycling Scheme Operation and Eligibility Criteria and an application form;
- III. develop and distribute information to assist applicants to the scheme;
- IV. provide ongoing access to information and advice with respect to the scheme;
- V. in each period, assess each application against the scheme criteria;
- VI. in each period, determine the eligible tonnes for each application for the purposes of calculating returns;
- VII. provide to the ACWM a schedule of returns detailing each organisation name, the tonnes claimed, eligible tonnes, recommended return, total of recommended returns and confirmation that each application has met the scheme requirements; and
- VIII. provide to the ACWM a statement signed by the Chief Executive Officer of the Western Australian Municipal Association confirming that the process of administration described in Schedule 1 of the Memorandum of Understanding on the Municipal Recycling Scheme has been carried out.

2. REPORT ON ADMINISTRATION

The following advice is provided to confirm that MWAC has met its obligations in respect of the administrative duties outlined in I to VIII above.

Item I – The application form used in Period 4 was designed to compliment the MS ACCESS database that has been used to tabulate the data collected to date. The format of this database has been updated to improve the efficiency of generating reports and data analysis.

Applicants making claims for green and organic waste were required to complete a Greenwaste/Organic Waste Processing Certificate to verify that the material claimed has been processed. The certificate also requires details about the product that the material has been converted to (ie mulch, compost) and the end use of the material (ie agricultural application, parks and gardens, mine site rehabilitation).

Item II – All Councils and Regional Councils in WA and the Rottnest Island Authority were forwarded an application form and information package one month prior to the closing date for applications and were notified again two weeks prior to the closing date. Councils were advised that copies of the Scheme Criteria would be

made available on request. This was done to save paper as no changes have been made to the Scheme Criteria since the Scheme's commencement.

Item III – An updated information flyer reflecting the key areas of concern from the first three periods of the Scheme was produced and distributed to all Councils and Regional Councils and the Rottnest Island Authority.

Items on the Scheme were published on several separate occasions in the MWAC Information Bulletin and in the WAMA Week. These publications are distributed to all Local and Regional Councils in WA.

Item IV – The MWAC Executive Officer and the MWAC Waste Management Officer have provided written and verbal advice on all aspects of the scheme as requested by all applicants that contacted MWAC for information.

MWAC made a concerted effort to encourage more rural Councils to participate in the Scheme during Period 4. A series of information seminars, which included a presentation on the Municipal Recycling Scheme, were conducted in rural areas of the State during June this year.

Item V – All applications received have been assessed against the scheme criteria in coming to a determination with respect to eligible tonnes.

An application from the Shire of Denmark was received after the closing date. MWAC has recommended that this application not be accepted as ample notification of the closing date was given and, as the Shire of Denmark had applied for funding in the previous three rounds of the Scheme, it was familiar with the application process.

MWAC applies a rigorous assessment process to all applications received in each Period of the Scheme. This includes cross-referencing of supporting documents with tonnes claimed, follow-up of supporting documentation that has not been provided by applicants and making a determination of the commercial component (if any) from the various collection methods used by applicants. Appendix 1 shows the significant difference between tonnes claimed by applicants and tonnes awarded following MWAC's assessment process.

Key Performance Indicators (KPIs) were again used during MWAC's assessment of Period 4 applications to identify Councils whose recycling systems achieved exceptionally high yields. Those Councils were then contacted and requested to provide possible reasons for the high performance of their systems and to confirm that material from commercial sources has not been included. A list of KPIs for each applicant is provided in Appendix 2.

Responses from the Councils contacted confirmed that none had included commercial material in their kerbside recycling figures. MWAC will be writing to all Councils who claim material from drop-off centres asking if any material from a commercial source is collected through these facilities. MWAC will deal with this matter in future Periods on a case-by-case basis.

MWAC intends to forward advice to all applicants in Period 4 advising that their application has been received and processed and that a suggested rebate amount has been forwarded to the ACWM. The amount of the suggested rebate will not be disclosed in this advice.

The advice will also provide feedback to Councils on how they can improve their application, which will help to reduce the amount of time spent by MWAC in assessing and processing applications.

Item VI and VII – Schedule 1 (Summary of Returns – All Regions, Period 4) of this report contains the information required under section VII. This report shows returns generated from greenwaste and from other recyclables. Also included (Appendix 3) is a report that provides a detailed breakdown of materials claimed for each applicant.

Item VIII – Schedule 2 (Confirmation of Due Administration Process) is a signed statement by the Chief Executive Officer of the Western Australian Municipal Association attesting that the administration process has been carried out in accordance with the guidelines contained in the Memorandum of Understanding on the Municipal Recycling Scheme.

3. CONCLUSION

The information provided in this report will also be included in the annual report following the completion of MWAC's assessment for Period 4. The annual report will tabulate data for the third and fourth periods of the scheme and provide recommendations for amendments to the operation of the Scheme.
